JUST ADD WATER?

To get the longest life and most enjoyment out of cut flowers, begin with a clean vase, preferably one that has been washed in the dishwasher. Otherwise, the presence of bacteria poses a real threat to flowers. Next, add lukewarm tap water to the vase. It has less oxygen, which helps prevent air bubbles from migrating up stems to slow water uptake. Lukewarm water also encourages some flowers to open, with the exception of spring bulb flowers such as daffodils

and tulips which prefer cold water. To further increase the availability to water, be sure to cut stems at an angle. This provides the stem opening with a bigger surface area, through which it can take up water.

HINT: The flower food provided by the florist is scientifically formulated to keep flowers fresher longer.

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install a slate roof for \$100,000.

The only significant damage was to the building's sill plate, which is the frame anchored to the foundation, Cowie said.

"The sill plate has been rapidly deteriorating in several areas due to incorrectly graded asphalt placed around the building by Transit in 1983," Cowie said. "The rotted sill plate undermines the structural integrity of the entire

building."

Cowie said to rebuild the sill plate, hydraulic jacks may be used to lift the entire station to replace it.

Cowie is hopeful that the alliance will reach a temporary lease agreement, for a nominal fee of \$1, with Transit by the end of the month, pending a report detailing its plans and fund-raising strategies.

Department of Environmental Protection spokeswoman Darlene Yuhus said any work proposed for the site must be approved by the

DEP because the station is listed on state and federal historic registries.

"We obviously want to see historic property maintained properly, and we encourage proactive groups to step up to the plate," Yuhus said.

Cowie said the objective is to recreate the station's original look without replacing parts of the building.

"It's like building a time capsule."
